When you create a piece of work it is automatically covered by full copyright – that means you are the only person who has control to do anything with that piece of work.

A **Creative Commons** licence means that people can display, copy, distribute, and webcast your work, **HOWEVER** – there are certain rules that they have to follow and different CC symbols that mean different things...

Some of the Creative Commons symbols, what they stand for and how they can be used

**CC**

	Can someone use it commercially?	Can someone create new versions of it?
<b>Attribution</b> 		
<b>Share Alike</b>  		Yup, AND they must license the new work under a Share Alike license.
<b>No Derivatives</b>  		
<b>Non-Commercial</b>  		Yup, AND the new work must be non-commercial, but it can be under any non-commercial license.
<b>Non-Commercial Share Alike</b>   		Yup, AND they must license the new work under a Non-Commercial Share Alike license.
<b>Non-Commercial No Derivatives</b>   		

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
